## Bud & Pierrette Hebner Little Current, Ontario

In our youth, we played competitive badminton in Ontario. We became a couple and badminton was a large part of our life, playing 5-6 times a week. In the early 1970's we were mixed champions in Northern Ontario. We married in 1974, had 3 children and careers moved us to small Northern Ontario towns where we introduced and coached badminton in our communities. It continued to be our way of life for ourselves and our children but over the years, other family commitments and issues drifted us away from the sport.

We retired in a small community, Little Current, Ontario on the North Shore of Lake Huron, Manitoulin Island (world's largest fresh water island). Neighbours of ours, David Helen pickleball and Hall, ambassadors, were attempting to get pickleball started up in our community and invited us to come out and play pickleball. Not knowing what to expect, we had a blast and became addicted immediately! With our badminton background it was an easy transition and even brought us back to our younger days, the only difference is that all the players are much older.

In Little Current, we play indoors in a curling rink during spring, summer and fall before the ice is set for curling. There are many challenges playing on a curling rink because the floor is cement, although cool in the summer, it is quite cold in the fall as the community ice arena is next to our courts. It is not unusual to find players actually dressed in winters coats, vests and gloves at this time. We have 17 club members who are all registered with the Ontario Pickleball Association. Some players are competitive and some are beginners but we are all in it to have fun, socialize and get some exercise while we're at it. Our club has a system of timed matches and random selection of a different partner for every match. Being a small organization it is a win win situation for all as it gives all players a chance to challenge each other. Our club welcomes visitors, families and friends. Seeing that we are situated on the North Channel of Lake Huron. we also have a number of boaters passing

through who join us at times in the summer. We play 3 times a week for 3 hours and of course, we have various socials afterwards.

We've never had formal coaching. Our skills are mostly self-taught by watching videos, playing better players, practicing various drills and experiences learned at tournaments. We are always looking to improve our play any way we can.

Living in Northern Ontario makes it a challenge to play in tournaments because they are all in Southern Ontario or Northern US states. Travelling up to 8 hours three times plus each summer & fall is nothing out of the ordinary for us.

In our first Ontario Provincial Tournament in 2012, we lost every single game we played. We learned from that experience and in our second Ontario Provincial Tournament in 2013, we surprised ourselves and actually won the GOLD in the under 60 category and in 2014 SILVER in the under 65 category.

Since our retirement in 2012, we have become Snowbirds in Winter Haven

Florida. In searching the internet, we've found great places to play in Central Florida and have been able to connect with upcoming tournaments. We live in a small retirement community with only 1 pickleball/tennis court. small introduced the sport at Winter Haven Oaks and since then, the park managers allowed us to paint pickleball lines on the tennis court once they realized that interest was growing in the park. We will be working on them to get a second court painted up. Ontario friends in the park that we intoduced the game to, enjoyed the sport so much that they brought it back to their home town of Kingsville, Ontario and they now have 78 members.


We promote pickleball as much as we can and belong to the Pickleball Association of Ontario, Canadian Pickleball Association, and United States of America Pickleball Association

I try to play in as many tournaments as possible for the joy of learning from others. This year I ventured further afield and it was my pleasure to be a part of the Nationals in Abbotsford.

I enjoy helping to teach Pickleball and promote the game to anyone who will listen. I have been invited into schools to teach students the game, am an ambassador for North York and currently am on the board of Pickleball Canada. I encourage others to play the game whether it be for recreation or competition.

# Sodium Intake in Canada & How to Reduce Sodium Intake

Canadians eat about 3400 mg of sodium each day. This is more than double the amount we need! Although sodium is an essential nutrient, our bodies need only a small amount to be healthy. Too much can lead to a variety of health conditions, including:

high blood pressure (hypertension)

Vascular and cardiac cell damage

Heart disease and stroke

Kidney disease

Detrimental effects of calcium and bone metabolism

Severity of asthma

Benefits of Reduction

High sodium intake has been shown to significantly increase the risk of cardio-vascular disease and stroke. Dietary sodium

reduction is an efficient way to reduce the risks. In Canada, it has been estimated that if the average sodium intake is decreased by 1840mg a day, high blood pressure prevalence would decrease by 30%. This would result in approximately one million fewer Canadians with high blood pressure and annual cost savings of \$430 million due to fewer physician visits, laboratory tests and medication. This reduction would also prevent an estimated 23,500 cardiovascular disease events per year in Canada—a decrease 13% over current numbers, with an additional \$949 million annually in savings.

How to Reduce Sodium in your Diet

Cook with herbs, spices, fruit juices and vinegars for flavor

Remove table salt from the kitchen

Read the nutrient labels at the grocery store and opt for low-sodium options

Avoid canned soups and vegetables, use fresh or frozen

Avoid processed foods, deli meats and high sodium condiments

When eating out, ask for your food to be prepared with little or no salt. Request your dressing and sauces "on the side"

### Fraser Valley Pickleball Celebrates 1st Year Anniversary







Question: Is it a fault if I am accidentally hit



by the ball or if I catch the ball if I think it's going out of bounds?

It is a fault if the ball in play strikes a player or anything

the player is wearing or carrying. There is one exception to this rule: if the ball strikes the player's paddle hand below the wrist, the ball is still in play. If the ball strikes a player standing out of bounds before a fault has occurred, that player loses the rally. In doubles, if the serve strikes the receiver's partner, it is a point for the serving team, providing it is not a let serve or a fault serve. This rule also includes balls that appear to be hit out of bounds: during play, if you catch the ball or try to stop it from heading out of bounds, you lose the rally.



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
